When Categories Outgrow Persons

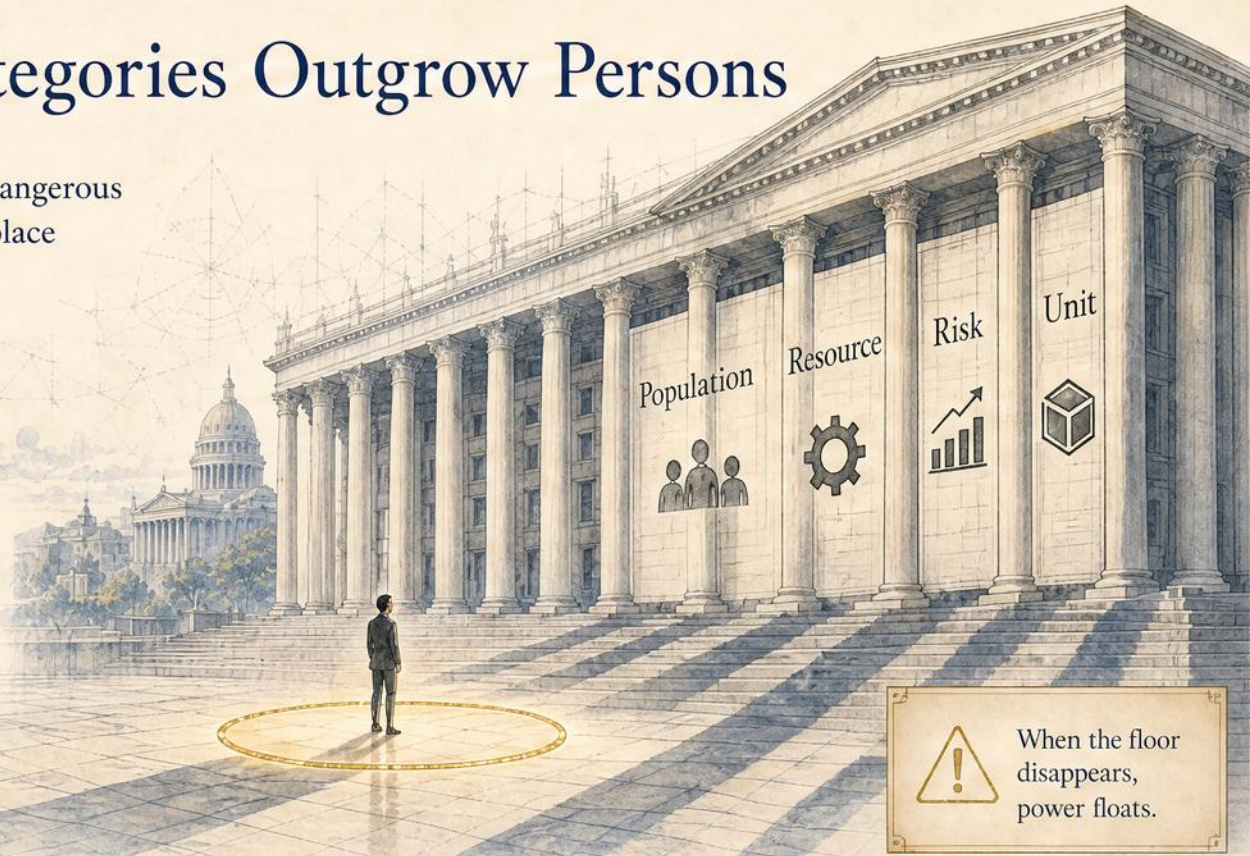
Institutions become dangerous when abstractions replace the **living subject**.



Abstractions scale.
People do not.

A Map of the Argument



Standing

The minimum floor that makes claims possible.



Identity

The irreducible continuity of the human subject.



Law

The order that recognizes, limits, and protects.



Boundary

The line that keeps protection for persons distinct from power.

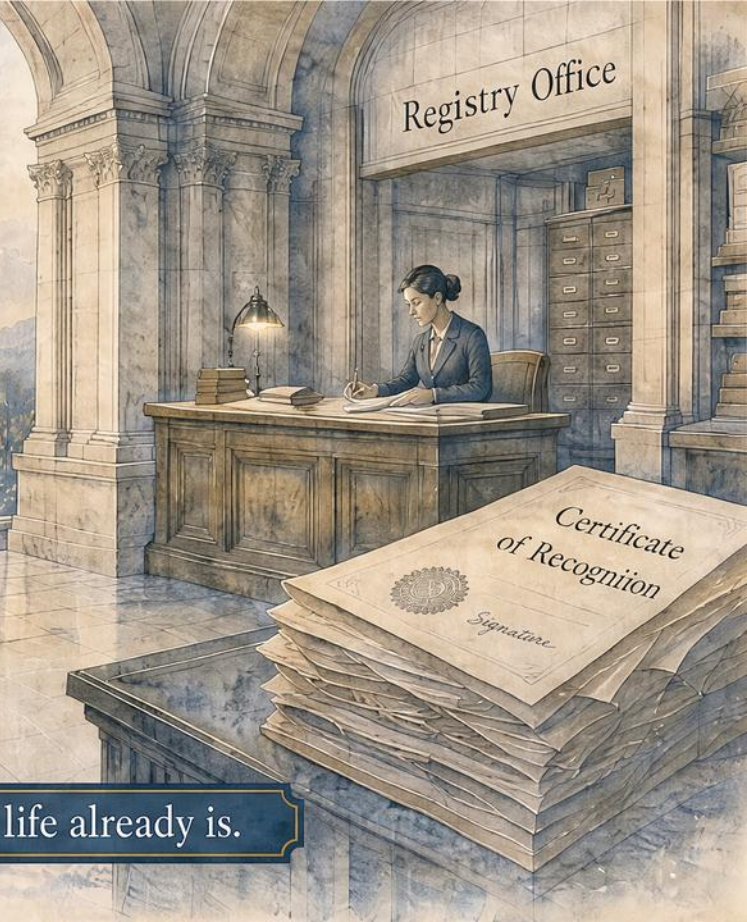

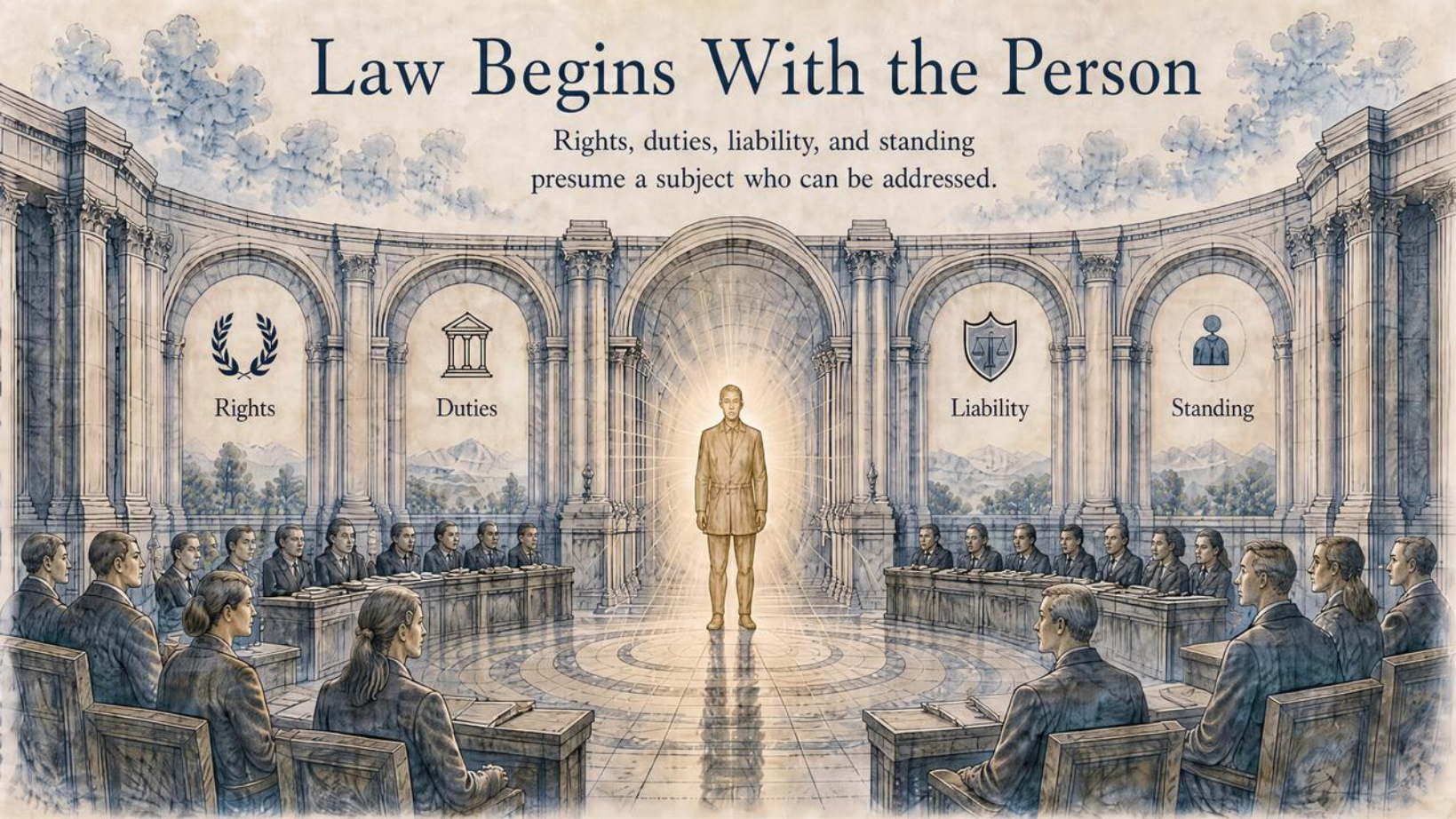

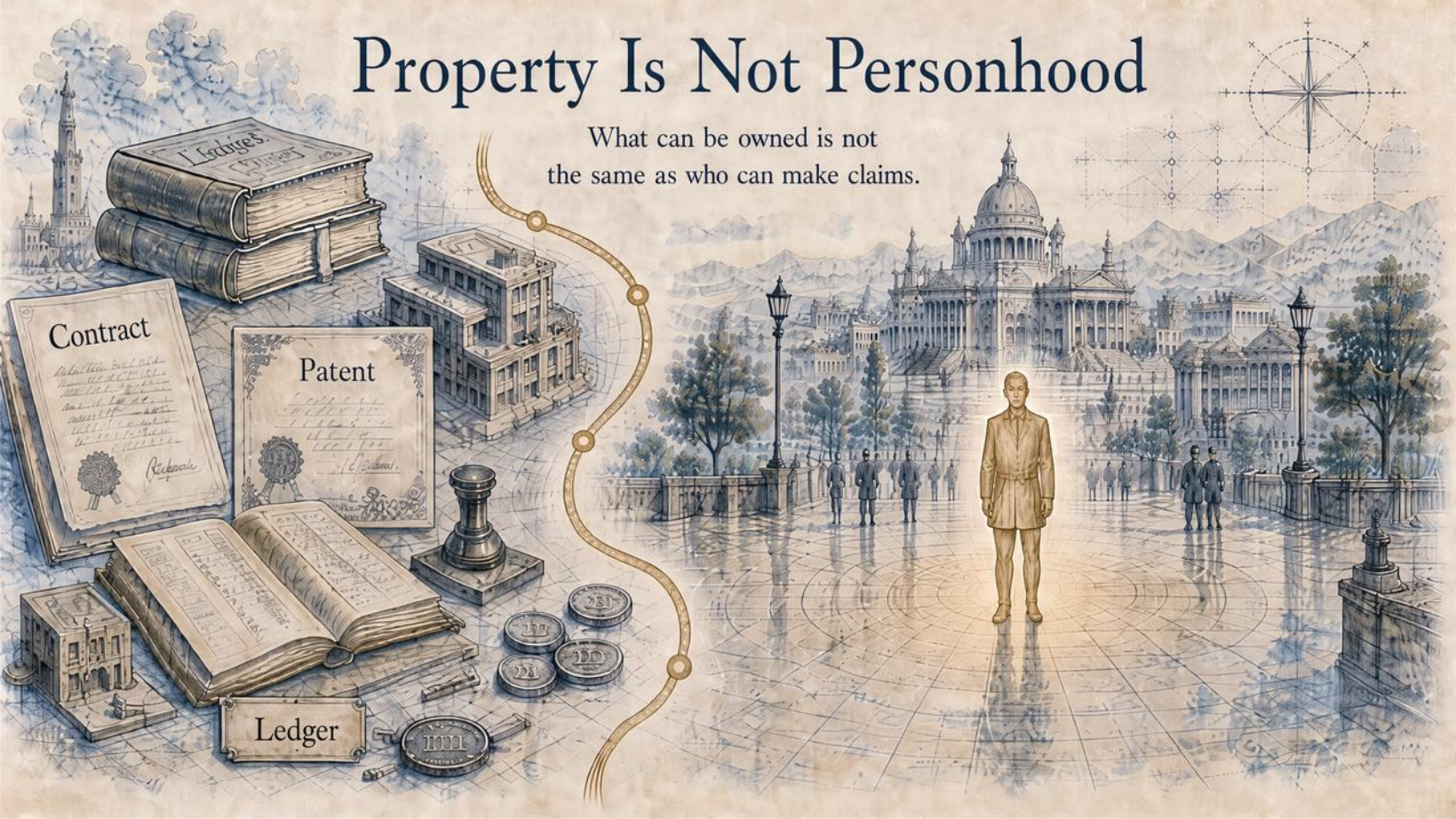
Law Begins With the Person

presume a subject who can be addressed.



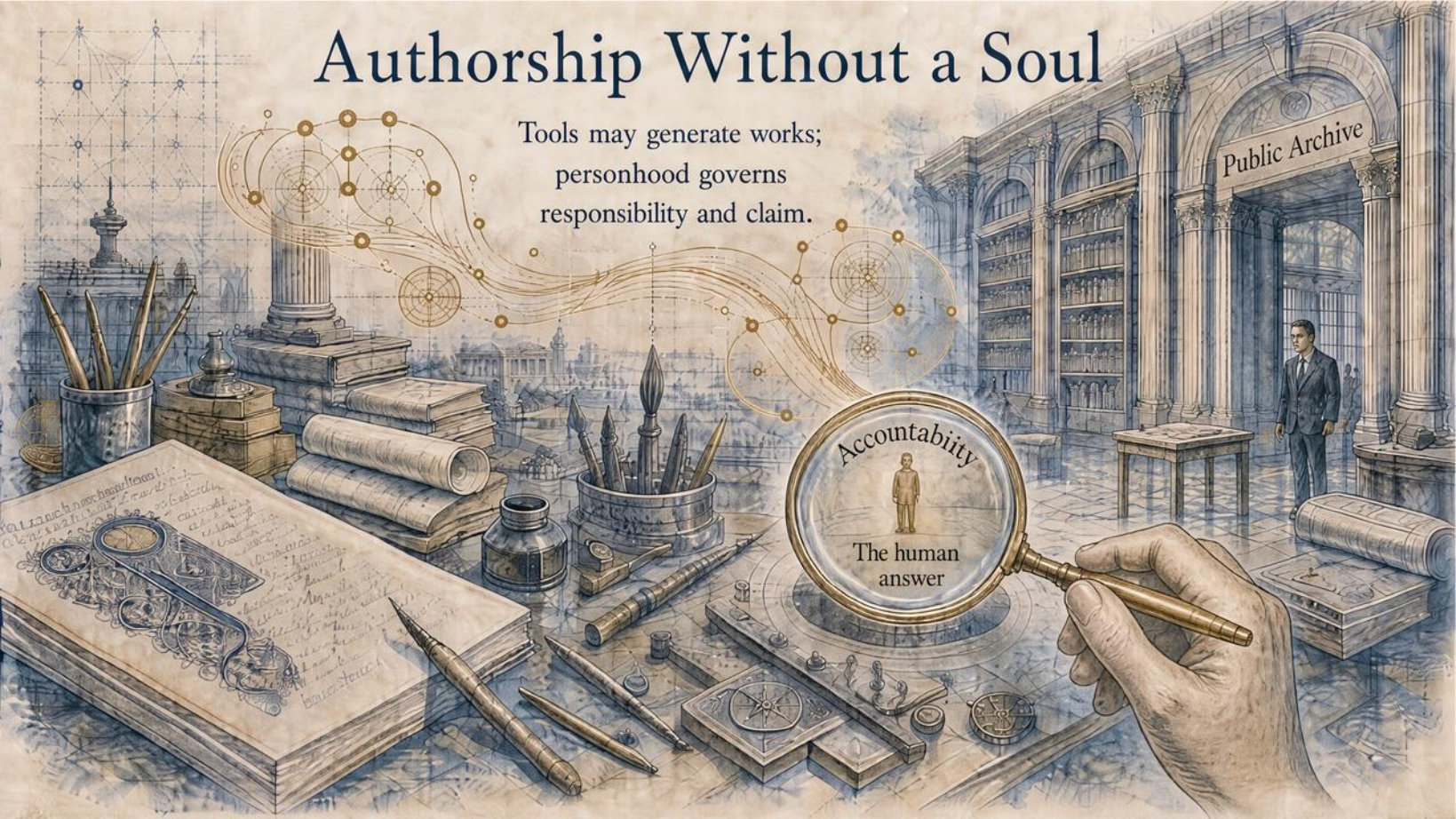
Property Is Not Personhood
